A Word From Our Pastor.....

Some places on earth can get pretty cold in October; it feels even more so when one stays out in the forest for days on end. The following is a story that gives pause on what to be thankful for...

In late October, a small American patrol is scouring the highland mountains looking for intelligence on enemy movements. They banter back and forth about how hot it was down in the jungle, but in the higher elevations, it can still become quite chilly. Temperature fluctuates when storms come in from the coast; it can routinely fall 30 or more degrees in a few minutes. To a scout that has been out for a couple of weeks, in the mountains, these fluctuations tear the body's system down. Often, soldiers in 90+ degree weather, can suddenly find themselves in 50-degree weather; it is a shock to the system that can cause violent shakes and, at times, even mental disorientation. On just such a hike, a squad of men found themselves shivering in the cold when they became drenched with rains and the temperature fell rapidly. With the condition they were all in, the young—heck, they were all young, it was not a place for old men—squad leader ordered them to begin to descend the mountain to seek warmer air. They helped each other because they were often stumbling from the severe shaking. Still, they kept, somehow, a form of crude soldier humor going and took care of all their equipment. The squad leader had the RTO (Radio Telephone Operator) call the company and seek an airlift out by chopper (helicopter). Walking hundreds of feet down in elevation, the soldiers began to feel warmer and actually dry in some ways, but they were all still shaking when they heard a familiar sound—the whop, whop, whop of Huey blades drawing ever closer. What a glorious feeling to see the whirlybird appear! The helicopter had to sit down some distance away, but knowing it was there, gave all of them joy and strength to move on. That day, three of the seven-man squad were sent over to battalion med station, while the other four remained.

I often think back on these stories of my life that seemed difficult, when my day or days seem tough as I have grown older. They remind me that the little things are what make life worth living. We often get stuck on waiting for that “big event” to bring us happiness, when sparks of joy are all around us, just waiting to become a warm fire in our day's journey. I would encourage you to remember the love of Christ, the breath you breathe, the person you got to visit with today, your cup of coffee, or the “sleep in freedom” you had as sparks of joy to make a good day. Jesus said, “Do this in remembrance of me;” partake of the bread and the wine as the symbols of the gift of eternal life in the sacrifice of the Lord's life. Little things to get you through the sudden storms.

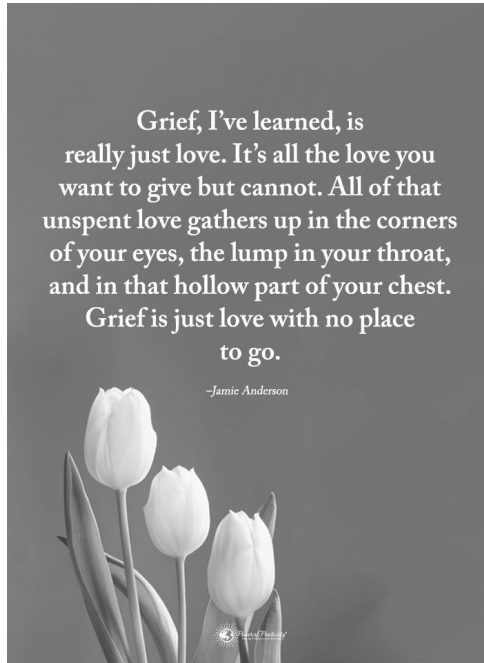

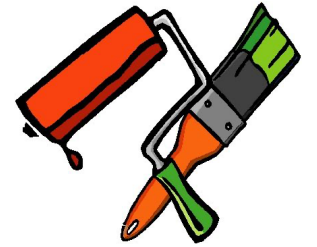
