A Word From Our Pastor.....

“Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God’s will for you in Christ Jesus.”

“This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice today and be glad in it. Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful.”

These verses call to mind the very deep need for us to be thankful and to show gratitude. The season of thanksgiving is upon us. We make plans. We prepare to visit and interact with family. We often look forward to eating too much, for it is Thanksgiving after all. How is it, that in our humanity, we need to have a calendar event to remind us to be thankful or to remember to be grateful? There are lots of lovely things we take for granted daily: good people, family, graceful trees, cool breezes, flowers, birds—indeed all the beauties of nature. We love them, are grateful for them, appreciate them, and, in the nicest way, we take them for granted. We expect them to always be there, to always be beautiful. God, divine love, is all. He is everywhere. He is closer and more dependable than the air we breathe. We take the air for granted; we know it is all around us—it is a natural thing. In the same manner, we can accept with reverence the omnipresence of God. It is not good to take a fellow human being for granted. It is especially not good to take God for granted. Many people are guilty of this. We fail to appreciate God as we should because we have become too familiar with Him, His blessings, and all the things He has done for us. We are so used to what He does for us, or the benefits we enjoy from Him, we assume they are our right. We feel we deserve them. We are so used to them; we behave as if they are normal things we **should** have. Sometimes, because this is how we treat fellow human beings, we extend this same treatment to God. Scientific research supports the health benefits of a grateful heart. Gratitude is strongly and consistently associated with greater happiness. It helps us feel more emotionally positive, helps us relish good experiences, helps us deal with adversity, helps us build strong relationships, and even improves our health. Gratitude opens our spiritual eyes. There’s a beautiful cycle in giving God thanks: the more we thank Him, the more we see Him working in us, and around us. Gratitude helps us sense God’s presence, His personal care, and His perfect timing. Gratitude, for the magnitude of God’s undeserved kindness, draws us to Him and is something He asks us to be in all things. May we have a grateful heart, a grateful spirit, then we can find peace in life. The more grateful we are, the more like Christ we become, and the more satisfying life is.

"A Scrapbook: The Tableau Through the Decades" by Jody Romine

A tradition that started in 1950, continued until 2015, went on hiatus from 2016-2021, returns this Christmas!

As most of you know by now, we are going to revive our Christmas Tableau this year. The following is a brief history. It was started in 1950 by the 3M (Mr., Mrs., and Miss) Sunday School Class. Our preacher at that time was Jack Lancaster. There isn't much historical information available; however, The Tribune was on it! The newspaper articles and pictures are old and yellowed, but describe those early years.

The Presbyterian tableau quickly became an event that the community looked forward to every Christmas. If you ask anyone who has been in Bay City any length of time about the tableau, the thing you hear most is "Never missed it!" In 1953, The Tribune called it "one of the most impressive aspects of Christmas in Bay City."

Most everyone who participated through the years has fond memories. Luke Speckman says, "I remember helping Dad direct traffic when I was too young to participate; those smudge pots were always burning and smoking. I told people to dim their lights and waved them on with my flashlights. I felt real grown up! Sometimes it was so cold, I had my hands stuck in my pockets to keep warm." Luke's sister, Caressa, also participated and she continued the tableau tradition at their church in Pleasanton when they moved there many years ago. The Speckmans were a three-generation tableau family!

Renee Gloeckner Smith adds, "I remember when we had to change out our shifts, we had to do it quietly and with the least amount of distraction, so it didn't disrupt the scene. I also remember being so cold and soooo thankful for the hot cocoa after our shift. I would take my mug of cocoa outside, walk across the street, and stand and take in the tableau scene

in front of me. That is one of my most favorite memories—looking at what God did for us.

I also remember those life size camels; you needed a ladder to get up on them; they were so impressive! The cars drove by so slowly trying to take it all in; everyone seemed so respectful.

The Christmas Tableau was an important part of Christmas for me. Looking back, I can see that it helped me refocus on what Christmas is all about.”

Jody Romine remembers “how quiet everything seemed. Outside, with all the people and cars going by, the Christmas music coming from the speakers was the only sound. I too remember the hot chocolate and refreshments after our shifts. The aroma of the hot chocolate filled Robbins Hall with such a welcoming and inviting atmosphere to come in from the cold! Even in Robbins Hall, the center of all the activity, it was fun but quiet at the same time. The cold and the quiet made it almost mystical.”

From the Music Stand.....

We all know that music speaks to everyone in some manner. After all, it is a universal language. I can go anywhere in the world, even if I do not know the spoken language, and participate in the local music in some way. I can do this by singing (using the teaching method of Solfege (do, re, mi) or Kodaly (hand signs for the notes)), by playing the piano (even in a limited capacity), or by reading the notes of the music.

Certain songs remind us of different times in our life—happy or sad, uplifting or reflective. As a kid, the hymn “This Is My Father’s World” is one I remember marching into the church house singing during summer’s Vacation Bible School. There were 150 kids of all ages singing it together! Even after I had graduated to being a helper and teacher for VBS, this tradition continued.

Songs come to us when we need them most and they serve a purpose. When was the last time you woke up with a song going through your head? For me, I actually realize I am singing a song while I’m sleeping and then awaken still singing it. The song can be sacred or secular, from your past or something you recently heard. It resonates with you for a reason.

What songs speak to your heart? Which ones come to your mind more often than others? God does not hesitate to speak to us, to reach out to us continually, and He will use any method necessary to do so. We just need to listen and then sing that song with a glad heart.

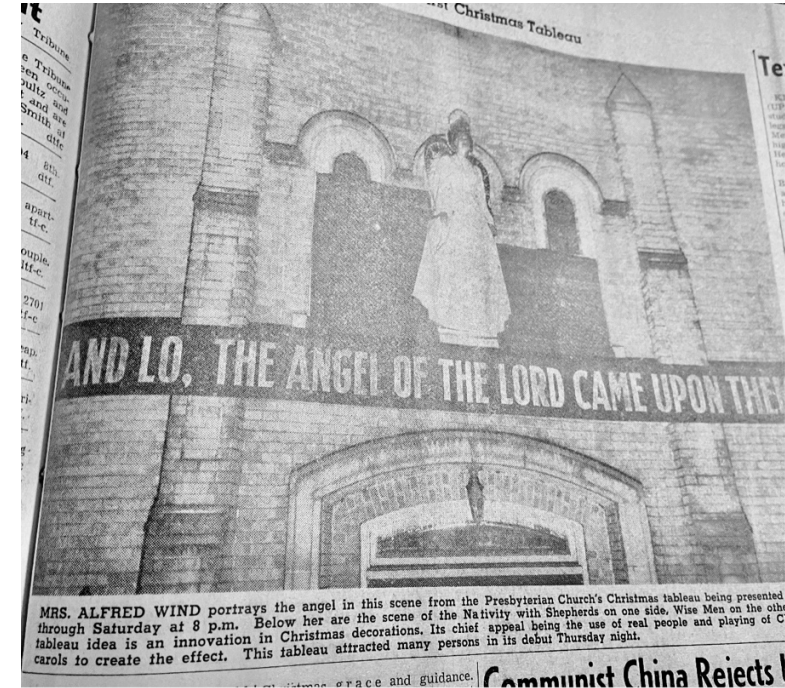

In 1950, the Angel would stand in a half barrel on the ledge outside the second-floor window above the front door.



A quote from Prissy Obermeyer who was once an angel standing in that half barrel:

"First of all, the costume was long and flowing; it had wings and a halo. By the time you got all that on over all the warm clothes you owned to keep yourself warm, you were much larger than usual. The stairs back then were different than they are now. They were narrow and hard to navigate with your new size. Once you did make it upstairs, you had to climb out the window and step into a half barrel attached to the window and drape your angel robe over the front of the barrel and stand in the "angel pose" for an hour. For you "new" angels, the angel pose is hands out in front of you, palms facing up. Try standing still like that, for an hour!"
